Introduction and Context			

Llangyfelach Community Council was formed in 1979 and consists of 9 Councillors. It covers an area of 1711 hectares (2011 Census). The Ward is situated approximately 9km North-West of Swansea City Centre. It is bisected by the M4, with Junction 46 being a gateway to Llangyfelach.

Llangyfelach Community Council is a Group 1 Council under the Nature Recovery Action Plan (NRAP) classification. The Council does not own or manage any land or property. Its primary functions relate to representing the local community, supporting local initiatives, and providing small grants. The Council covers a population of approximately 2,500, with a precept of £30,000. The Council is not subject to the Well-being of Future Generations (WFG) Act but seeks to align its activities with its principles where possible.

Although the Council's direct influence on land management is limited, it can still play a significant role in promoting biodiversity through its decision-making, community engagement, and support for local projects, potentially via its Grants & Donations Policy.
